Our Work

August 1. <u>2014 Pelican Award Winners</u>. A fisherman, a realtor and a former senator are among the 15 recipients of this year's awards, which honor exemplary efforts to preserve and protect the coastal environment.

August 6. <u>Restored Coastal Marshes Fight Climate Change</u>. That's what researchers found at the N.C. Coastal Federation's wetland restoration project in Carteret County. It's all about the blue carbon. But what is blue carbon?

August 12. <u>Community Farm Takes Root in Carteret</u>. The N.C. Coastal Federation's EarthWise farm started with a seed -- first planted in the imagination of an old man and then in the soil by his children.

August 13. <u>Coastal Culture: Miss Blanche of Ocracoke</u>. Blanche Howard Jolliff is 94 and an island treasure. She remembers, for instance, the shipwreck that led to the first road on Ocracoke and the first road collision.

Coastal Policy
