The draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) was issued by the Corps of Engineers on the proposed terminal groin project at Bald Head Island on January 3rd. Our staff is reviewing the 800-page document to develop strategies to further oppose this project. A public hearing has been scheduled for February 12th in Southport. We expect the revised draft EIS for Figure Eight Island at Rich Inlet to be released soon as well as the DEIS for Holden Beach at the Lockwood Folly Inlet. We continue to follow these projects closely.
