
What are Cisterns?

- Cisterns are tanks made out of plastic, metal or cement that capture runoff from rooftops of houses or buildings.
- Gutters on buildings can be used to collect and direct water into cisterns.
- Cisterns can hold anywhere from hundreds to thousands of gallons of water.

Why install cisterns?

- They reduce the amount of stormwater running off your property onto roads and into stormdrains.
- Cisterns can save you money on monthly water
- Captured stormwater has many uses. It can be used to irrigate lawns or gardens. It can also be used to flush toilets and wash cars.
- If filtered and purified, captured stormwater can be connected directly into houses for everyday purposes such as washing dishes, drinking water, and showering.
- Cisterns represent a type of passive method in creating resilient communities in the coastal zones. In case of large storms, hurricanes or drought, the stored water could allow people to stay in their homes longer when municipal water sources are shut down or when wells are polluted.
