It's been kind of quiet around the offices this week. Several staff members (including the boss) are in Washington, D.C. attending the seventh national habitat restoration summit hosted by Restore America's Estuaries (RAE) and The Coastal Society.

One of the highlights of the summit is the unveiling of a national evaluation of barriers to the use of living shorelines and recommended actions to overcome these barriers. Along the coast, many property owners still bulkhead their waterfront properties instead of using the more natural "living shorelines" method.

The report, called "Living Shorelines: From Barriers to Opportunities," was funded by NOAA and prepared by RAE. Todd Miller led the committee that developed

National Seashore Seeks Dark-Sky Park Designation

The Outer Banks. particularly the southern



Outer Banks, has one of the darkest skies east of the Mississippi River. The Cape Hatteras National Seashore is working to qualify as an International Dark-Sky Park, which would make it the second one in the Southeast and the only coastal park in the world. The designation would come from the International Dark-Sky Association, a nonprofit founded in 1988 to raise awareness of light pollution.
