The Coastal Federation was created to help people of all walks of life work together for a healthy coast.

We listen to and work with thousands of coastal residents and visitors to solve pressing environmental challenges to protect and improve our coastal economy and way of life.

After 38 years, some of the ways we work changed dramatically this year because of COVID-19, struggles for social justice and extreme weather events. We curtailed in-person programs and volunteer events, and hired more contractors to remove marine debris, build living shorelines, install stormwater retrofits and restore wetlands. We shifted to educate our communities virtually through new online resources including our Distance Learning Lab for

students and online trainings for professionals. Our advocacy work went virtual as well as we convened hundreds of stakeholders via Zoom to devise strategies to restore oysters, promote nature-based strategies to improve water quality and reduce flooding, and battle industrial chemical contaminants in our drinking and surface waters.

Despite these challenges, our collaborative spirit remains in place. By continuing to work together, we can make our coast healthy, resilient, and a great place to live, work and play for generations to come.

OUR MISSION The North Carolina Coastal Federation empowers coastal residents and visitors from all walks of life to protect and restore the water quality and critically important natural habitats of the North Carolina coast.

Summary of Major Accomplishments

The North Carolina Coastal Federation provides leadership on the coast through education, advocacy and restoration of habitat and water quality. In 2019 we:



Restored nearly 11 acres of oyster reef



Infiltrated over 19 million gallons of polluted runoff



Restored nearly a half-mile of living shorelines



Addressed stormwater through retrofits and watershed plans at six



Cleaned up 3,112 crab pots and 210 tons of marine debris



Conserved 50 acres of land as part of our 10,050-acre conservation network



Launched a coastwide program to recycle oyster shells from consumers into reefs



Directed nearly \$2.5 million to the coastal economy to restore habitat



Engaged people to protect the coast from offshore drilling and pollutants like GenX



Reached over 488,000 readers and won 27 awards through Coastal Review Online




Engaged 5,257 people through presentations, events and volunteerism
